Understanding Computer Jargon

When I went to college in the 1980's, I heard a lot of words like "data input" and "beta version." They confused me. I wanted desperately to know what people were talking about, what Big Secret resided in the computer industry. Now that I've worked in a computer company for the last few years, I've gained an insider's perspective. I decided to share my knowledge with the uninitiated by creating the following brief, handy glossary:

Alpha. Software undergoes alpha testing as a first step in getting user feedback. Alpha is Latin for "doesn't work."

Beta. Software undergoes beta testing shortly before it's released. Beta is Latin for "still doesn't work."

Computer. Instrument of torture. The first computer was invented by Roger "Duffy" Billingsly, a British scientist. In a plot to overthrow Adolf Hitler, Duffy disguised himself as a German ally and offered his invention as a gift to the surly dictator. The plot

worked. On April 8, 1945, Adolf became enraged at the "Incompatible File Format" error message and shot himself. The war ended soon after his death and Duffy began working for IBM.

Default Directory. Black hole. Default directory is where all files that you need disappear to.

Error message. Terse, baffling remark used by programmers to place blame on users for the program's shortcomings.

Hardware. Collective term for any computer related object that can be kicked or battered.

Help. What we all need. Actually, it is the feature that assists in generating more questions. When the help feature is used correctly, users are able to navigate through a series of Help screens and end up where they started from without learning anything.

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"Boot Magic" Software Review

When I decided to review Partition Magic 4.0, someonE Deliberately suggested that I also review the support application, Boot-Magic. I saw this as an opportunity to write one small review on BootMagic to see how effective I could be when I wrote a review on PartitionMagic. I would suggest that members of the NOPCC look into reviewing software since it is a relatively easy way to get some cool software and books.

There are a few new support applications that come with Partition Magic 4.0. Among those is BootMagic, a new program that replaces the Boot Manager of PM 3.0. A somewhat quick examination confirmed this program has a lot of the features that are in Norton's System Commander. BootMagic has support for DOS, Windows 95, 98, and NT, among others. BootMagic is basically a Partition Menu with the ability to set the default OS and to choose what timeout. It also comes with an easy Install New OS feature. It even gives you the ability to create a BootMagic rescue disk of sorts for each OS in the menu.

The BootMagic user guide has 60+ pages and comes bundled with the PartitionMagic package and explains in an easy to read fashion the features of BootMagic. The guide includes a nice Troubleshooting appendix. The book takes a quick glance to find out what to do to install it and how to configure BootMagic. The test was to follow the directions to see how this application installed and ran on our test machine.

The test machine is a simple 486DX66 with 20MB RAM running Windows 95 OSR 2 as its main Operating System. The installation of BootMagic went off without a hitch. One minor disturbance is in the creation of the rescue diskette. The application calls the format floppy dialog window then expects the user to press the correct buttons. After the files are copied to the floppy, the installation program fires off a DOS shell that executes the label command to set the label. If you ask me, this was pretty cheesy. Well, anyway, BootMagic is really cool and it even allows you to move the mouse when selecting which boot options you want. After installing Partition Magic 4, we decided to resize our Windows 95 partition and install a new partition for a DOS 6.2 OS install. We created a small 8MB partition for DOS to use. DOS installed fine without complaining about seeing a previous OS like Windows 95 since BootMagic hid the partition. We did try to allow the DOS 6.2 OS to see the Windows 95 partition as a D drive, but it never worked. It warned us a few times about the possibility of messing things up with Windows or OS/2, but it didn't let us see the AT16B partition from DOS 6.2. I don't know if this is a feature or a bug. Maybe I will find out before I complete the PartitionMagic 4 review. So far, Partition-Magic's wizards seem like a vast improvement over Partition-Magic 3 and other partition managers.

Anyone up for a Linux SIG? In the NOPCC Chat echo on NOPCC BBS, we've been discussing the usefulness of starting a Special Interest Group on Linux, which is essentially an open operating system in the public domain.

There is currently a stampede of interest in Linux, spurred by reports of Microsoft's perceived anxiety of the threat to its Windows NT family; and by the present release of RedHat 5.2, with its comparative ease of installation.

Make no bones, however; Linux is not exactly plug and program. It is comparable in difficulty to Windows NT, which means it takes a wonkish talent and geekly determination to tackle this project.

The chief advantage is that the user has the source code to play with, to customize and innovate, and to exchange patches.



Linux is becoming popular with collegians; I've been to university sites who are encouraging their students to download and experiment. This is a very active and fast-moving area, and we think a SIG for NOPC members devoted to "alternative" operating systems such as Linux would be a Good Thing.

We've had requests from SIGs for an upgrade to the display hardware so that attendees could better view onscreen presentations at SIG meetings. At the most recent meeting of the Club's Board of Directors, Manny Dennis and I moved a request that the Board support the SIGs by matching funds raised by them , up to \$300, to be used to purchase a Signal Splitter and a new 17" monitor for use at SIG Meetings.

The Board voted approval, so the SIGs can go to work and dig for the cash. Every dollar raised by the SIGs for a monitor and splitter will be matched by the Board up to three hundred dollars. The Board figures this is the best way to support the SIGs, by a challenge to the SIGs for self-help with matching funds.

Windows Application SIG News

Last month, on November 5th, the Windows Application Developers SIG met to see a brief overview of Visual Basic 6. Microsoft graced us with a special demo kit which we tried to use to give the group an overview of some of the neat features in VB6. The slide presentation was quality as always, but, unfortunately for our speaker, the demos needed to be run on Windows NT. So we took an alternate path and tried to field questions pertaining to new features in Visual Basic 6. We did a little piddling with the new Data Environment Designer. It is a cool feature that must be explored in more depth at another time. We had to improvise some cool code examples to answer the many questions our group had. The group hopes to have another excellent demo on Visual Interdev 6 this month on December 3rd. Yu Shen will attempt to give an overview of Visual Interdev 6 with the aid of some samples from the Microsoft user group demo kit. Visual Interdev is Microsoft's flagship Internet/Intranet development environment. It doesn't replace Java or FrontPage, but merely helps developers intergrate components into spectacular web based applications. I hope you will join us and please bring some questions for us to experiment with.

The WADSIG would like to support a new Visual C++ sig. Please come to the next meeting if you are one of those people who contact me every few months about an interest in a C++ sig. I will be happy to kick some meetings off but, first, I need you to come together to generate some speakers and topics. I will dedicate a few minutes of the next WADSIG to discuss this sig. The WADSIG would also like to remind you that we don't target a particular programming language, only the platform. Anyone interested in software development will find the company and discussions worth attending. Remember, the WADSIG meets on the first Thursday of each month at 6:30pm at New Horizons Computer Learning Center and the 3rd Monday following the VBLG at McCann Electronics. I would like to take the time to thank New Horizons and McCann Electronics for allowing us to use their facilities to hold our meetings every month. I would

also like to thank Mike Housey for hosting our WADSIG webpages at http://www.banlen.com/wadsig. We recently moved our website from LanYap to Banlen.

Visual Basic Learner's Group

The Visual Basic Learner's Group has reached over 35 two hour meetings, over 11 VB Learning tapes, and 2 code reviews. We have been meeting weekly, or nearly so, since February 1998. We are bringing in a close to 1998 and I would like to wish everyone who has attended faithfully Happy Holidays and Seasons Greetings. I look forward another good educational session in 1999. The group will probably have to delay a few sessions nearer to the holidays. The group has changed to manage multiple skill levels. The SIG meets every Monday at 6:15 pm at McCann Electronics. The SIG recently restarted the video series during the first 45 minutes or so. At the same time, the intermediate group or those beginners who already saw the videos, attempt an informal workshop type session. The workshop is geared to get your elbows dirty and up to your ears in code that you might be working on or having problems with. Once 7:00 pm rolls around, both sessions meet up again to watch the second set of videos that come from the advanced level tapes. These tapes cover such topics as Client/Server development, ActiveX controls, ActiveX documents and ActiveX Automation. After about a half hour of completely technical tapes, one of our Visual Basic mentors, "who so graciously dedicates time to help others learn this stuff," comes in to answer any questions the users may have on either the beginner videos, or the more advanced videos, or on any projects they may be currently attempting.

The VBLG is still learning with VB5, but soon we want to upgrade to VB6. If you are remotely interested in learning how to develop software using Visual Basic, please come join us. On the 3rd Monday of each month we usually like to take the group up a level and show some pretty neat advanced development techniques as part of the WADSIG.
